How to Deter Thieves During the Holiday Season

December is here and, with the holidays just around the corner, many of us will be running around town doing last minute shopping or decorating our homes. Most of us let our guard down and create an opportunity for thieves to steal our be-



longings or vandals to destroy our property. They are waiting for the perfect opportunity to take advantage of the hustle and bustle of the holidays.

Here are some tips to make sure your personal property does not end up in the wrong hands or destroyed this Christmas.

1 **Resist the urge to "check-in" on social media.** Sure it may be fun to let all your friends know that you are trying out the newest restaurant in town or even that you are out of town on a fabulous vacation, but many experts advise against these types of broadcasts on social media. A friend of a friend of a friend may see your post and know exactly when to target your home.

2. Lock your door. Our parents always told us this as kids, but sometimes we let our defenses down because we feel like we are living in a safe neighborhood. Statistics gathered by ADT Security company show that 40% of all burglaries are termed as "no force entries." That means the predators gained entry through unlocked doors or windows. Check that all your doors and windows are locked when you are not home.

3. Keep your lights or radio on with a timer while you are away. This can signal to a burglar that someone is home. Set the lights to turn on and off in different rooms at different times.

4. Keep your garage door closed and locked and any garage door openers hidden and locked in the car. Often, we keep our garage door open while we are working in the yard, or while our kids are outside playing. Experts agree that this is never a good idea. Often, criminals will drive through residential neighborhoods and take an inventory of what they see inside garages with a plan to come back at a later time. Also, try not to keep big ticket items in the garage during the holidays. If you keep your garage door opener in the car, take it out of the car if you park your car in the driveway rather than the garage.



5. Display the Christmas tree – NOT the Christmas gifts. It is uncomfortable to realize that, while we are away, thieves may look through our windows. They do and especially at this time of year. If possible, it is better to wait until Christmas Eve to set out the gifts. Otherwise, make sure that your curtains are tightly closed while you are away.

6. Think carefully when putting out your trash or recycling. Often at this time of year, thieves or burglars may look through our garbage to try to figure out what we have purchased. If you have boxes that indicate that something expensive might be in the house, experts advise taking the box directly to the recycling center rather than putting it in your garbage or recycling bin.

7. If you are going out of town, consider having the Central Point Police do vacation checks on your home. Trained V.I.P.S. (Volunteers In Police Service) will perform an inspection of your property while you are away on vacation. The inspection includes a perimeter check, physical and/or visual check of all doors and windows, verification of vehicles left on the property, and verification of any people found on the property. This service helps to deter potential burglars and provides for additional security while your house is unoccupied. 

Board of Directors Met on November 16 to Discuss Business

On November 16th, the Board of Directors held their bimonthly meeting in the clubhouse.

When the Association transferred the water and the storm drains to the City of Central Point, our attorney recommended that we amend our governing documents to reflect that change. When the Board began reviewing the governing documents, they noticed that there were several parts that needed to be amended. Some of these amendments were due to changes in the Oregon statutes, however most were due to typos and confusing language. The Board made the changes they thought relevant to the Association, and sent those to an attorney specializing in governing documents for Homeowners Associations. The Board went over the recommendations made by the attorney and made plans to present the amendments to the Association members in 2017. The financials of the Association were approved. The Board of Directors also reviewed the preliminary budget for 2017. The Budget will be finalized and approved during the January 18th Board of Directors Meeting.
