New Pool Hours

House painting update

It is not the intention of the board to fine residents, rather, like most residents, the board wants our neighborhood looking kept up and well maintained.

If you are changing your house color, please make sure you get approval from the board or association manager.

CC&R's Corner Speed Limit

Did you know that our CC&R's address a speed limit for vehicles driving on our association streets? Specifically, the CC&R's state: Speed within the Subdivision is TEN (10) MPH. Speed violators will be reported to the Homeowners Association and may thereafter, be fined by the Homeowners Association.

Enforcement of this speed limit is difficult for the association board and manager because we do not have access to DMV records, and we don't know all vehicles owned by our residents and/or their guests.

If it is presented to the board or manager that a specific resident or one of their guests has been speeding through our streets, we will not hesitate to give a warning. If the problem persists, fines may be imposed.

It is important that all residents and their guests follow the posted speed limit signs as many of our residents run, walk and jog on our streets. Many children play in front of their homes, on sidewalks or in the streets riding bikes, etc.

POINT ON ASSOCIATION BUSINESS

Homeowner Rights and Responsibilities

As assessment-paying members of our community, we are entitled to certain rights and—in return—we have certain responsibilities.

Homeowners have the *right* to:

- 1. Participate in governing the community association by attending meetings, serving on committees and standing for election.
- 2. Access appropriate association books and records.
- 3. Expect prudent expenditure of fees and other assessments.
- 4. Live in a community where the property is maintained according to established standards.
- 5. Receive fair treatment regarding financial and other association obligations, including the opportunity to discuss payment plans

and options with the association before further action is taken.

- 6. Receive all documents that address rules and regulations governing the community association—if not prior to purchase and settlement by a real estate agent or escrow officer, then upon joining the community.
- 7. Appeal to appropriate community leaders those decisions affecting non-routine financial responsibilities or property rights.
- 8. Expect a responsive and competent community.

In turn, homeowners have the responsibility to:

- 1. Read and comply with the governing documents of the community.
- 2. Maintain their properties according to established standards.
- 3. Treat association leaders honestly and with respect.
- 4. Vote in community elections and on other issues.

- 5. Pay association assessments and charges on time.
- 6. Contact association leaders or managers, if necessary, to discuss financial obligations and alternate payment arrangements.
- 7. Request reconsideration of material decisions that personally affect them.
- 8. Provide current contact information to association leaders or managers to help ensure they receive information from the community.
- 9. Ensure that those who reside on their property—tenants, guests or family members—adhere to all rules and regulations.

Back To School Before the Bell Rings: Back to School Safety

As boys and girls throughout the community sharpen their pencils and get ready to head back to class, it's important to ensure they have a safe school year. Here are some tips on how your family can be proactive and avoid potentially harmful situations:

Make sure your school has your child's updated emergency contact information. Write down any specific instructions that should be followed in case of an emergency, and have the school keep them in your child's file.

Talk to your child's teachers and alert them to any medical issues your child has. Also, explain to the teacher what he or she should do if the medical issues arise—such as an allergic reaction, asthma attack or seizure—and provide school personnel with emergency medication such as EpiPens[®] (Epinephrine Auto-Injectors) and inhalers.

Help your children memorize important phone numbers so that they know how to get in touch with you and other trusted adults. Also, make sure those numbers are programmed into their cell phones, or provide them with a list of phone numbers that they can keep in their backpacks or wallets at all times.

Let your children know exactly who they can go home with after school if their regular ride can't pick them up, and make sure they know not to accept rides from people who aren't on the list.

If your children will be walking to bus stop, walk the route with them several times before classes start to make sure they understand traffic laws and can walk the route on their own. Also, find a friend or sibling they can walk with, and make sure they always use the buddy

Show your children which houses in the neighborhood they can go to in case no one is at home after school.

Advice for Working Parents

With a new school year underway, many parents and caregivers fret about children who spend time on their own before or after school. According to some estimates, more than three million kids under 12 are home alone at least part of the day. That's inevitable given the number of single-parent households and families in which both parents work.

We all want our kids to be safe and secure, so we did a little research. Here are some basic tips to help make sure your kids know how to handle being home alone.

Have your kids check in with you or a responsible adult as soon as they come home. They can call your office phone or your cell phone. If you are unavailable, they should leave a message.

Set up guidelines for answering the telephone. Let calls go to voicemail, if available, unless caller ID indicates that a family member or friend is calling.

Establish clear rules for keeping doors locked and answering the door. In most cases, children should not open the door unless it's a family member or a well-known and trusted neighbor or friend.

If Internet access is allowed, establish standards and clear restrictions, such as setting up parental guidelines for websites and chats. Also remind children that talking to strangers is just as bad an idea online as it is in public.

Make sure your child knows how and when to call 911— an important reminder for all of us. If you see anything suspicious or threatening in our community, call the police immediately.

Finally, don't worry that your children will suffer emotional or psychological damage by fending for themselves a few hours a week. According to one news story, a report cited by the American Psychological Association found that the success of children who spend time at home alone depends more on what kids are doing with their time after school, rather than the fact that you're not with them 24-7.

At schools across America, teachers see two types of first-year students: one quickly adjusts to school and begins to enjoy it, the other cries each day at the door. By applying some easy-to-follow Love and Logic[®] guidelines, parents can help their youngsters belong to very lucky group- students who start school with fun instead of fear.

Arrange a tour of your child's school before the year starts.

It's not unusual for young children to imagine the worst when they don't have enough information. Big fears about where they are going to sit, where they will eat, whether their teacher will be "nice," and what they will do if they need to use the restroom become much smaller when parents take this step.

POINT ON GOOD HEALTH

Acetaminophen is the most common drug ingredient in America. While it is safe and effective when used as directed, there is a limit to how much can be taken in one day: 4,000 mg for most adults. Taking more acetaminophen than directed can lead to liver damage.

According to the Acetaminophen Awareness Coalition, sometimes people may unintentionally exceed the 4,000 mg daily dose because they don't realize that several medicines they take -- such as pain medications and fever reducers, cough/cold and allergy medicines, and even some sleep aids -- may all contain acetaminophen.

So, when taking a medicine that may contain acetaminophen, always read and follow the medicine label and know if your medicines contain acetaminophen and never take two medicines that contain acetaminophen at the same time.
